

The Dean's Column


Greetings!

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COOPER-MILLER SCHOLARSHIP UPDATE

The Central North Carolina Chapter of the American Guild of Organists recently awarded their 2017 Cooper-Miller Organ Scholarship to Joshua Sobel, 15. The prize consists of a check for \$1,000 and a two-year membership in the AGO. He will spend part of his prize attending a Pipe Organ Encounter (POE) this summer in Hartford, CT.

Joshua's audition pieces were:

Prelude and Fugue in C, BWV 553, J. S. Bach (J. L. Krebs?)

Prelude in Classic Style, Gordon Young

Foundation - hymn tune prepared for congregational singing

Joshua's piano teacher is John Herrmann, who has an M.Mus. degree from Eastman where he studied with both Russell Saunders and David Craighead. Joshua's organ teacher is Josh Dumbleton,



who holds the B.M. and M.Mus. in organ performance. Josh has studied with Dr. Ron Davis and Dr. Gerre Hancock, among others. He is pursuing the Doctoral of Music Arts in Organ Performance at UNC. Both teachers are active church organists.

The Sobel family, from Cary, NC, noticed Joshua's musical talents when he could pick out tunes and chords on the piano at the age of 4. When he was 9, he asked if Santa could bring him a pipe organ. A search on the internet found an ad for a small 1970's Laukhuff 4-rank, which had been abandoned by a church in Oberlin, Ohio. The organ was rescued and restored by the Leek ("Lake") Pipe Organ Company of Ohio. In 2010 it was installed in the Sobel's living room and just barely fits under the 9' ceilings.

Perhaps an indicator of Joshua's ease and confidence at the organ was in evidence after his



scholarship audition. A judge surprised him with a request to improvise on the hymn, including a key change. Joshua's response was "What key would you like?", followed by a very pleasing rendition.

Joshua attends Enloe High School in Raleigh, where he enjoys singing Tenor in the chorus. He also likes to spend time in a flight simulator, part of his training to earn his pilot's license. He likes the quote, "Hard work beats talent when talent fails to work hard." This young man seems to have a good supply of both attributes.

I would like to thank our 2017 judges, Michelle Seaboch and Jim Haynie. Michelle has judged most of the Cooper-Miller auditions since the beginning. Jim was co-creator of our scholarship and has stayed active, despite the fact that he has retired from NCSU and moved to his hometown of Irvington, Virginia. The third judge, Janet Cherry, was unable to participate this year due to a conflict.

AGO RECEIVES GRANT FROM THE NATIONAL ENDOWMENT FOR THE ARTS (NEA)

The American Guild of Organists (AGO) has been awarded a grant by the National Endowment for the Arts (NEA) to support educational programs and career development for organists, choral conductors, and composers in 2017, including new music commissioned for the AGO National Convention in Kansas City, MO July 2–6, 2018. While the AGO has received regular support from the NEA since 2005, the \$25,000 "Art Works" award is the largest grant the arts endowment has ever given to the Guild.

"This grant covers the full breadth of the AGO's educational activities for current and prospective members as well as our programs of outreach to the public," stated AGO Executive Director James Thomashower. "The NEA's funding sends an uplifting message to the entire organ community: our instrument and its music are vitally important to the American people. The award validates the AGO's ongoing efforts to ensure that music for the organ is created by talented composers, performed by skilled musicians, and appreciated by the widest audience possible. It is an honor for the Guild to be recognized by the NEA, the most prestigious independent federal agency in the United States responsible for funding and promoting artistic excellence, creativity, and innovation."

In December, the NEA announced that it will award more than \$30 million to nonprofit organizations and individuals across the country in 2017. Nearly \$26 million of that will be for Art Works, the NEA's largest funding category. Art Works focuses on the creation of art that meets the highest standards of excellence, public engagement with diverse and excellent art, lifelong learning in the arts, and the strengthening of communities through the arts. The NEA will give 970 Art Works grants to organizations in 48 states, the District of Columbia, and the U.S. Virgin Islands in 2017.

"The arts are for all of us, and by supporting these projects, the National Endowment for the Arts is providing more opportunities for the public to engage with the arts," said NEA Chairman Jane Chu. "Whether in a theater, a town square, a museum, or a hospital, the arts are everywhere and make our lives richer."

Pipe Organ Encounter Advanced(POEA) is for students in grades 9-12 who have achieved a high level in organ study. Prospective students must submit an audition recording to apply. A POEA provides daily lessons and a unique opportunity for participants to meet and interact with peers who have similar interests.
