#### Workshops for the Day

8:45 AM - Welcome and Gathering in the Chapel

**9 AM - In Search of the Lost Chord**: Creative and Effective Hymn and Service Playing with John Walker. Focus on basic techniques of hymn leadership at the organ to encourage strong congregational participation. Ways to communicate the meaning and spirit of the text will join creative ideas for musical enhancement of hymn accompaniments.

10 AM - Adapting Piano Music to the Organ with Carol Williams. The following topics will be discussed: Adapting piano scores for the organ. Adapting popular music often requested at weddings. Where to find this music. Suggested registrations.

11 AM - New Music You MUST Know About with Matthew Russell. This session will present you with new compositions and arrangements that are accessible and lovely. These will be "must have" selections in your music library.

Noon - Lunch (Boxed Lunch and drinks provided)

- 1 PM Conducting from the Console with Matthew Russell. Discover the most practical ways to lead your choir from the console, or piano. Easy techniques and methods will be shared to aid all who fill both roles as accompanist and conductor
- 2 PM Console Management with Monty Bennett. This workshop will explore how the organ's computers can help you enhance your musicianship. We will explore setting pistons and registration options, as well as piston sequencers, crescendo pedals, midi controls, and how to use them in an artistic way.
- **3 PM Using the iPad As Your Music Folder** with Steve McBride. This workshop will teach you everything you need to know to utilize your iPad as an easy and functional resource for your music library. We will cover the basics of using the iPad, how to scan music, copyright issues, and using the iPad in your playing.

4 PM - You May Not Want To Talk About It with Al Murrell, Mark Andersen, and Steve McBride. This Discussion Panel will address the decline of the use of the organ in worship services. How can you encourage and justify the increase of the organ in church?





Kerry Johnston is Director of Music Ministry at First United Methodist Church Cary. Born in Wichita Falls, TX, Kerry holds a Bachelor of Music in Organ Performance from Midwestern State University in Wichita Falls where he studied with Dr. Ronald Hough, and a Master of Sacred Music from Perkins School of Theology, Southern Methodist University, Dallas, where he studied with Dr. Larry Palmer.

Kerry has served churches in Texas and Arkansas as organist, organist/choir director, and minister of music. He was also the co-founder and director of Ozark Bronze, an auditioned community handbell ensemble in Northwest Arkansas. Kerry believes that music ministry is the best venue to involve lay ministers in worship leadership. He and his wife have four adult children, and six grandchildren. Kerry loves being outdoors, gardening, and visiting his grandchildren.

A native of Atlantic Highlands, New Jersey, **Michael Accurso** is an energetic, versatile, and dynamic musician. At once a conductor, organist, composer, and vocalist, Accurso enjoys an active schedule in academics, concert performance, commissions, and liturgical music.

As a conductor, Accurso has performed and produced several masterworks (Haydn's Missa in Angustiis, Fauré's Requiem, Victoria's Officium Defuntorum, Vivaldi's Gloria, Handel/Mozart Der Messias) as well as collections of lesser-performed works. In 2013, Accurso performed a collection of pieces from Medieval Spain, taking an interdisciplinary approach, incorporating medieval spiritual traditions, costume, dialect, and period instruments. Most recently, Accurso conducted the University of Notre Dame Vocale in a performance of Tomas Luis de Victoria's Officium Defunctorum at the church of Santa Maria in Monserrato in Rome. In addition to Rome, Accurso has conducted selections of Fauré's Requiem in Quito, Ecuador for an international sacred music festival and throughout the United States and Canada, including at Princeton University, during The Princeton Festival Masterclass with Jan Harrington.

Accurso's main area of passion is in the liturgical arena. Accurso has musical leadership positions in Indiana, Michigan, and New Jersey and was a regular cantor at the Cathedral of Saint Patrick in New York, New York.

Within the past few years Accurso has engaged in liturgical composition. He has recently finished a massive undertaking of setting all of the lectionary psalms used for mass in the Roman Catholic Rite. This project incorporates all of the psalms used for Sunday masses, weekday masses, and all of the ritual masses. The project is currently under review for publication. He also recently composed a piece for the Rite of Dedication of an Altar, commissioned by Caleb Wenzel for Saint Mary Church in Bristol, Indiana. Et Alius Angelus, is a festive setting of the antiphon used during the incensation of the altar and occupies texts from the Book of Revelation and Psalm 138.

As a vocalist, Accurso performs primarily from the genre of oratorios and cantatas. He has performed bass-baritone arias from Handel's Messiah, Bach's cantatas BWV 4 Christ Lag in Todesbanden and BWV 140Wachet auf, ruft uns die Stimme, and most recently Faure's Requiem.

Accurso is at present the Director of Liturgical Music for the Catholic Diocese of Raleigh and Holy Name of Jesus Cathedral in Raleigh, North Carolina. In this role, he was commissioned to compose a hymn for the Dedication of Holy Name of Jesus Cathedral, which was dedicated in July of 2017. He has completed the Doctor of Musical Arts degree in choral conducting at the University of Notre Dame in Notre Dame, Indiana. He studied conducting with Carmen-Helena Téllez and additionally studied organ with Paul Walker, voice with Stephen Lancaster, and musicology under renowned scholars, Margot Fassler and Peter Jeffery. He holds the Master of Sacred Music degree from Notre Dame where his

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New Members continued primary conducting teachers included Téllez, Jan Harrington, Nancy Menk, and Alexander Blachly. Accurso also holds the Bachelor of Music degree in

Sacred Music with a concentration in Vocal Performance, Magna cum laude, from Moravian College where his professors included Eduardo Azzati (voice), Paula Ring Zerkle (conducting), and Russell Jackson (organ).

public organ demonstrations. This year, they will give a recital at the Chapel, following the Evensong service on January 21, 2018.


#### JACOB M. MONTGOMERY

Studying organ under Andrew Scanlon, Montgomery has performed n masterclasses for Dorothy Papadakos, Dr. Janette Fishell, Dr. Mickey Thomas Terry, and Dr. Ann Labounsky. In addition to his certification from the AGO, he is a recipient of the Olive G. Long Memorial Scholarship for Piano, the Clay J. H. Organ Scholar Endowed Fund, Thomas Jones Scholarship for Chemists, and the Franklin Ritter Scholarship for Chemists. Montgomery hopes to pursue a career in medicine and research, while maintaining a position as an organist.

#### ORGAN SCHOLAR OPPORTUNITY

St. Paul's Episcopal Church, a parish in the Diocese of East Carolina, closely affiliated with East Carolina University's School of Music, invites application for the position of Organ Scholar. This position provides a hands-on opportunity for the candidate to learn and apply their skills in service playing, in the context of a music program firmly rooted in the Anglican choral tradition. The organ is an outstanding 3-man, 58 stop Fisk organ from 2005, residing in the church's 6-second acoustic. Duties include sharing in the weekly playing of hymns, service music and voluntaries, accompanying the choirs for psalms and anthems, and deputizing for the organist-choirmaster. The position will be tailored to meet the needs of both the music program and the organ scholar. This position could be occupied by a graduate or undergraduate student as a supplement to study in sacred music at East Carolina University. This position will be available summer/fall 2018.
