MARK ANDERSEN IN A FRENCH IMPROVISATION CONCERT/WORKSHOP


Dr. Mark Andersen was one of the last students of Marcel Dupré in Paris, and he also was a composition student of Nadia Boulanger, the noted composer and teacher of musical composition. Now retired back to North Carolina, Mark has twice won the International Composer's Competition in Amsterdam, Holland (1976 and 1999) and in 1985 he was honored by Governor James Martin with the North Carolina State Award for Excellence in the Arts. He has over 200 published works to his credit for organ, harp, choral, instrumental ensembles, and handbells. He can be heard on over 30 recordings made throughout his career. He still teaches and is heard weekly as the host of "Crescendo!" on cable television.

Dr. Andersen will bring us a program that discusses several of his award winning compositions and gives us the background for his composing and improvisation as taught by the great Marcel Dupré. We will hear several of these works on the wonderful Létourneau five manual organ at Edenton Street Methodist Church and learn how they came into being. We will also hear about how melodies are formed and the many ways in which they are harmonized.

Please join us for this entertaining and informative event. There might even be French pastries to set the mood!





ORGAN SCHOLAR OPPORTUNITY

St. Paul's Episcopal Church, a parish in the Diocese of East Carolina, closely affiliated with East Carolina University's School of Music, invites application for the position of Organ Scholar. This position provides a hands-on opportunity for the candidate to learn and apply their skills in service playing, in the context of a music program firmly rooted in the Anglican choral tradition. The organ is an outstanding 3-man, 58 stop Fisk organ from 2005, residing in the church's 6-second acoustic. Duties include sharing in the weekly playing of hymns, service music and voluntaries, accompanying the choirs for psalms and anthems, and deputizing for the organist-choirmaster. The position will be tailored to meet the needs of both the music program and the organ scholar. This position could be occupied by a graduate or undergraduate student as a supplement to study in sacred music at East Carolina University. This position will be available summer/fall 2018.

I don't know about any one else, but when I think of the AGO, I don't tend to think of vocal music. However, this is a highly inaccurate concept and our 2018 National Convention is, in fact, showcasing some wonderful vocal ensembles.

One of Kansas City's less hidden jewels is the Kansas City Chorale under the direction of Charles Bruffy. If you have heard of them, then you know what to look forward to. If you haven't heard of them, you need to drop everything and head over to YouTube. A few years ago (2015) they recorded Sergei Rachmaninoff's famous All-Night Vigil which won them the 2016 Grammy award for Best Choral Recording. Their performance is, hands down, my favorite vocal recording. No other ensemble or recording I have listened to has come close to that level of musicality.

The Kansas City Chorale will be kicking off our convention by performing multiple world premiers as well as other staples of the choral repertoire. The performance promises to be wonderful and I cannot recommend them enough.
