Member: Stephen Aber

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Malcolm Archer

Malcolm Archer is one of the world's

leading church musicians. He has enjoyed a distinguished career in cathedral music, which has taken him to posts at Norwich, Bristol, Wells Cathedrals and Director of Music at St. Paul's Cathedral in London. He is now Director of Chapel Music at Winchester College, where he is responsible for the College's ancient choral foundation, conducting the Chapel Choir and teaching the organ. During his time at St. Paul's Cathedral he directed the choir for several State services, including the Tsunami Memorial Service, the London Bombings Service and the 80th Birthday Service for HM The Queen, for which he was invited by Buckingham Palace to compose a special anthem, performed live on BBC.1. His many broadcasts and recordings from Wells and St. Paul's have received critical acclaim, and his CD of Christmas music from St. Paul's was voted Editor's number one choice in The Daily Telegraph. His own setting of 'Be thou my Vision' is featured on the debut album of the girl group 'Celeste' for Decca.

Malcolm is much in demand as a choir trainer and choral and orchestral conductor, and he has directed concerts, workshops, courses and summer schools in various parts of the globe, as well as working with several leading orchestras. He is also the Musical Director of the Jean Langlais Festival in France

Malcolm has served as council member of the Royal College of Organists, and he is a member of the council of the Guild of Church Musicians, from whom he was recently awarded the Fellowship for his services to church music over many years. In 2009, he was awarded the FRSCM (Fellow of the Royal School of Church Music) for his work in three cathedrals, and as a composer of church music.

UNCSA SummerOrgan Intensive June 24 - 29, 2018

Join UNCSA faculty member and nationally acclaimed organist, Dr. Timothy Olsen for a week of engaging and insightful instruction for young high school organists. Students that are either emerging with little experience (but with sufficient piano background) or who have already begun some organ instruction are encouraged to apply.

The week's activities include daily lessons, masterclasses, an excursion to a local organ builder, and opportunity to play and learn on world-class instruments in the Winston-Salemarea, as well as participation in an Evensong service in a local church. Students will gain valuable insights into practice techniques, healthful manual and pedal technique, various bodies of repertoire, hymn playing and basic improvisation.

The Pipe Organ Encounter (POE) is an introduction to the pipe organ through Instruction in organ playing, repertoire, history, design, and construction. These regional summer music institutes for teenage students provide private and group instruction in service playing and solo repertoire, along with opportunities to learn about the musical heritage of various religious denominations. The schedule includes opportunities for young musicians to meet others with similar interests. Piano or organ proficiency ranging from intermediate to advanced is required. Scholarship assistance is available.

Ransas City Jazz is a unique style combining many different elements in a way that can be hard to describe. It combines elements of orchestral ragtime, boogie-woogie, and rural blues. It relies heavily on repetitive riffs and is usually dominated by reed instruments, particularly the tenor saxophone, within a big band sound. This is where the railroads come in; Kansas City started its rise in the jazz scene in no small part due to it being a hub for itinerant bands performing throughout the Midwest and Southwest. Since jazz players in Kansas City were often on their way to somewhere else, it was important that the musical arrangements be simple and repetitive, something that could easily be committed to memory. Within that framework fell the solos.

Helped by the ultra-permissive environment fostered by city boss Tom Pendergast (remember, this was during Prohibition), Kansas City jazz was nurtured in legendary all-night jam sessions. These jam sessions were held in all-night clubs with the locus being around 18th and Vine. Many famous musicians were formed in and around these sessions; the most famous of these is probably Count Basie followed closely by Kansas City native, Charlie Parker who was instrumental in the transition from jazz to bebop.

Kansas City's legacy of live music jam sessions is still alive and well; venues all over the city host live music throughout the week. The American Jazz Museum at 18th & Vine features not only exhibits on the jazz greats, but also a fully functioning jazz club named The Blue Room. The Green Lady Lounge is a newer, very popular jazz club that does homage to Kansas City's rich musical history. All of these places, and more, are within easy access of the convention hotels.

At the 2018 AGO National Convention in Kansas City you will see and hear incredible performances by world-class organists and choirs, hear new music by some of the world's best modern composers, be able to check out dozens of workshops and seminars, and enjoy creative worship services in some of the most beautiful and historic organ venues in the country. The members of the Greater Kansas City Chapter of The American Guild of Organists look forward to sharing the grandeur of the city's organs and performance venues with you from July 2-6, 2018.
