Christopher Jacobsen, Chapel Organist & Divinity School Organist at Duke, will lead a workshop on Service Playing, Saturday, May 5th. The workshop will start at 10:00 in Goodson Chapel (directly next to Duke Chapel) on the Richards, Fowkes instrument, and then progress to the Aeolian instrument in Duke Chapel.



The workshop will cover the following topics:

- · Introduction to service playing/choral accompanying
- · Basic improvisation techniques
- Introduction to playing orchestral reductions of accompaniments at the organ

Christopher will also provide a brief overview of the AGO certification process.

Trained at the Eastman School of Music and St. Olaf College, Jacobson arrived at Duke after having been an organist at Trinity Episcopal Cathedral in Columbia, S.C., and the National Cathedral in Washington, D.C. In 2016, Christopher was awarded the Royal College of Organist Fellowship Diploma (FRCO), among the most prestigious international recognitions for organists. We are so blessed to have one of our own chapter members, with such broad experience in leading worship services, lead this workshop.

As well as numerous concerts in Sweden, Finland, Estonia, Monaco, Luxembourg, Holland, Poland, Germany, Denmark, Singapore, Korea, China and Russia.

Carol throws out a wide net to entice new audiences to the concert organ. She is known for her collaborations with various Jazz, Blues, Pop and Rock bands and performances with leading orchestras including the BBC Concert Orchestra, San Diego Symphony Orchestra, and the Beijing Symphony Orchestra to mention a few.

As a featured musician on many Blogs, PodCasts, Radio Stations and TV News in America, the United Kingdom and around the world, she highlights her profound love of the "King of Instruments", and is also featured on several other particular organ DVD projects and series.

In the United Kingdom, Carol has been elected an Associate of the Royal Academy of Music (ARAM) in recognition of her contribution to music.

The Jacobs Organ Academy, July 15-20, is designed along the lines of a European organ academy. Participants will receive intensive instruction in organ performance while also having an opportunity to explore various other interests and related studies. The JOA offers a track for college-aged organ students, and a pre-college track, both tailored to offer organists a substantive weeklong summer education opportunity within the US. We are keeping enrollment low enough to afford all attendees a generous amount of time on our two major Fisk concert hall organs. There will also be opportunities to play the new Paul Fritts organ, Opus 41, at First Presbyterian Church.

The JOA offers instruction in technique and repertoire, church music, theory, and registration, as well as plenty of practice time, an organ crawl, masterclasses, concerts, a closing performance, and a little fun along the way. The college-aged track includes a specialized focus on specific repertoire: this year's topics are the music of J. S. Bach and his North German predecessors, and music since 1900. The German Baroque focus will lead to a performance on the Fritts organ, while the latter repertory includes a survey in a masterclass/performance setting.

The pre-college track can accommodate experienced organists and newcomers to the instrument. We encourage pianists with an interest in organ to consider this as well; proficient pianists keen on learning to play the organ can expect to receive a thorough introduction to the instrument in a thoroughly stimulating environment.

Our faculty, Janette Fishell, Vince Carr, and Chris Young, have decades of teaching experience, preparing students for the challenging and fruitful world of church music, performance, and teaching, and encouraging them to embrace excellence in all aspects of their musical lives. Additionally, Academy fees and dorm costs are quite reasonable!

Malcolm Archer


Malcolm Archer is one of the world's

leading church musicians. He has enjoyed a distinguished career in cathedral music, which has taken him to posts at Norwich, Cathedrals Wells Director of Music at St. Paul's Cathedral in London. He is now Director of Chapel Music at Winchester College, where he is responsible for the College's ancient choral foundation, conducting the Chapel Choir and teaching the organ. During his time at St. Paul's Cathedral he directed the choir for several State services, including the Tsunami Memorial Service, the London Bombings Service and the 80th Birthday Service for HM The Queen, for which he was invited by Buckingham Palace to compose a special anthem, performed live on BBC.1. His many broadcasts and recordings from Wells and St. Paul's have received critical acclaim, and his CD of Christmas music from St. Paul's was voted Editor's number one choice in The Daily Telegraph. His own setting of 'Be thou my Vision' is featured on the debut album of the girl group 'Celeste' for Decca.

Malcolm is much in demand as a choir trainer and choral and orchestral conductor, and he has directed concerts, workshops, courses and summer schools in various parts of the globe, as well as working with several leading orchestras. He is also the Musical Director of the Jean Langlais Festival in France

Malcolm has served as council member of the Royal College of Organists, and he is a member of the council of the Guild of Church Musicians, from whom he was recently awarded the Fellowship for his services to church music over many years. In 2009, he was awarded the FRSCM (Fellow of the Royal School of Church Music) for his work in three cathedrals, and as a composer of church music.




