British-born Carol Williams is a concert organist, composer and Civic Organist Emerita in San Diego, where she made a name for herself performing classical, theater, jazz, rock and blues on a classical organ every week.

Carol could read music before she could read English. Influenced by her father, a fine amateur theater organist, there was always a Hammond organ in her Welsh home.



Carol began her classical training at the Royal Academy of Music, a student of David Sanger, where she was awarded all major prizes for organ. She was known as Miss Wurlitzer! She became a Fellow of the Royal College of Organists, a Fellow of Trinity College London, Associate of the Royal College of Music and she studied in Paris with Daniel Roth. Later, Williams undertook postgraduate studies at Yale University with Professor Thomas Murray and was awarded an Artist Diploma and the Charles Ives prize for outstanding achievement. She earned her Doctorate of Musical Arts at Manhattan School of Music and received the Helen Cohn award.

As a teenager, Carol remembers hearing George Wright and Ashley Miller at the four manual Wurlitzer in Kilburn, London as well as hearing Jimmy Smith in New York City. These great musicians made an indelible impression on her, and now she travels the world with her unique "Jazzical" style.

Carol hosts the "TourBus" DVD documentary series featuring "Large & Small, Famous & Unique" pipe organs of the world and is also host of "On The Bench with Dr. Carol", a YouTube series interviewing musicians.

Clinician: Rodney Barbour from Cincinnati, OH

Rodney L. Barbour, a native of Huntington, West Virginia, is an accomplished performer on low brass and keyboard instruments. He holds a B.A. in Music Education and Organ Performance from Marshall



University and an M.M. in Organ Performance from the University of Cincinnati.

Rodney's career has ranged from early performances with dance bands and the Holiday on Ice Orchestra to the Ringling Brothers-Barnum and Bailey Circus Band. He was a featured entertainer for a decade on the Mighty Wurlitzer Organ at the Springdale Music Palace in Cincinnati. In addition, Rodney held the positions of Official Organist of the Cincinnati Reds and for the Cincinnati Mighty Ducks AHL Hockey Team. worship leader, Rodney has directed adult and children's choirs as well as handbells and instrumental ensembles. He has written worship liturgies, performed solo organ concerts, led hymn festivals and accompanied choral and oratorio performances. He has also served as Dean of the Cincinnati Chapter of the American Guild of Organists. Rodney has been a manager for both Church Organ Systems/Baldwin Piano and Organ Company and Rodgers Instruments. His articles have been published in Church Music Digest, Music Revelation and Church Business.

Currently an educator and church music consultant, Rodney's most recent project is working with LifeWay Publishing adding MIDI Orchestrations to new organ releases with a companion "listening" CD for these collections. His recent "Songs of Life—Sounds of Faith" CD recorded on a blended MIDI/traditional Rodgers Organ is enjoying critical acclaim.



Richard Van Auken, a native of Quakertown, PA, began piano lessons at age eleven and organ at age thirteen. Shortly thereafter he was appointed

organist of St. Matthews Lutheran Church in Kellers Church, PA. Following graduation from high school and service with the U.S. Marine Corps in Korea, he studied at the Philadelphia Conservatory of Music as an organ major with Dr. Robert Elmore.



His piano teachers include private study with Eleanor Sokoloff (of Curtis Institute), Susan Starr, Kenneth Amada, and Natalie Hinderas. He has spent many years as an organist and choir director, and leads workshops and seminars in both piano and organ. For nearly thirty years he has been an Artist-Teacher in the music department of Moravian College, Bethlehem, PA and a visiting instructor at Lafayette College, Easton, PA.

Included among his writings are three books of hymn tune arrangements for organ which serve as accompaniments to congregational singing. The hymn tunes are chosen from 57 well known traditional hymns and are meant to help generate excitement and create a depth of meaning in congregational singing.

Evelyn Van Auken is the other half of this hymn arranging team. Their program highlights organ literature including the use of the organ in instrumental ensembles.

The new AGO Strategic Growth Plan presents many opportunities for CONO to become a major force in engaging, supporting, and uplifting every organist – especially those new to the organ. The CONO Panel of Advisors would serve voluntarily on an as-needed basis to advise the committee in their projects and directions. The time commitment will be entirely at the advisors' discretion and can be small and occasional.
