One of the required pieces includes a hymn to be sung by the attendees accompanied by the competitor. We need lots of people to sing! The event should conclude by noon. If the judges award a first or second place to this competitor he/she will move on to the regional. The judges can also decide not to make an award. Come and join us on Saturday, April 6th at 10:00 am. at St. Michael's Episcopal Church on Canterbury Road in Raleigh.



Catawba College - Salisbury, North Carolina

Catawba College is a small, faith-based (UCC), liberal arts college located about 45 miles north of Charlotte in the quaint town of Salisbury, NC. The 1000-seat Omwake-Dearborn Chapel, named for two former college presidents, is now 55 years old. At the time of the dedication, an electronic organ was in place but was later replaced by a 42 rank 3 manual Casavant pipe organ. Over the years, the pipe organ fell into disrepair and its baroque tonality fell out of favor. Several attempts were made to either repair the Casavant or replace it. Al Murrell, Vice President of R. A. Daffer Church Organs, Inc., built a strong relationship with Professor Paul Oakley and his successor Dr. Phillip Burgess by providing Rodgers Organs for their annual service of lessons and carols. Because of the relationship Al built over the years with college personnel, R.A.Daffer Church Organs, Inc was chosen to build and install the new four manual 84 stop Rodgers Organ. In addition, 17 ranks of the existing Casavant Organ were incorporated into the new instrument. The project which includes new wind chests will be completed in April of 2019. We wish to thank Dr. Phillip Burgess, Associate Chair of Music and

Mr. Bill Graham, Chair of Trustees for putting their trust in our company for this project. The new instrument will enrich the weddings and services that are held in this exquisite chapel for many year

Dr. John Schneider will present a brief demonstration of how a small church can continue to have music without an organist. Dr. Schneider operates the Synthia Hymn Player device through a laptop computer during services at St. George's. The Synthia plays hymns and service music through the church's organ and speakers.

At St. George's, Dr. Schneider has been creative in programming hymns as preludes, postludes, and communion music. He sits on the bench during the service and selects different stops on their two manual Rodgers to produce a variety of sounds.

This event is in conjunction with a Synod meeting at St. George's of the Anglican Diocese of the Atlantic States. The demonstration is designed for those lay delegates from small churches who struggle to find organists.

The demonstration will be followed by a service of Evensong; both events are open to the public.
