The Dean's Column



MAY 15, 2019: SYNTHIA COMPUTER PROGRAM DEMONSTRATION

ST. GEORGE'S ANGLICAN CHURCH, RALEIGH


I attended an interesting demonstration of the "Synthia", a computer program that links to and plays through an electronic organ. It doesn't do the job of a real organist, but it can provide music for a small church that cannot find, nor afford to pay, an organist. Synthia requires a dedicated person to operate the program, and there is a steep learning curve. Dr. John Schneider is that volunteer at St. George's Anglican Church in Raleigh. He has become skilled at programming the Synthia to play a complete service. A new option with the Synthia is to purchase and play MP3 files for other service music. An excellent website is smallchurchmusic.com. It offers "music resources for congregational and small group singing".

Following the Synthia demo there was a service of Evensong. Most of that service was chanted a cappella. One hymn was accompanied by the Synthia, and I observed John at the console as he smoothly changed pistons between verses.

Many of our chapter members will remember Carolyn Beard, who was organist at St. George's for many years. John says this experience has taught him a lot about the organ, plus he has gained a new respect for what Carolyn and all organists can do! He also says he learned "the organ bench itself is not an orthopedic mattress"; I think we all agree with that sentiment.

It may seem strange for us to take any interest in something that could replace organists. However, we are the people who might be able to prevent small churches from closing and locking their unused organs. We can advise them how to continue their musical tradition with Synthia, rather than switching to guitars and drums.

The Royal School of Church Music in America

The CAROLINA COURSE for girls and adults welcomes the Central NC Chapter of the American Guild of Organists to its 24th annual course at Duke University, July 8-14, 2019.

This year's course will be under the musical direction of Dr. Jared Johnson, Canon for Music at Trinity Episcopal Cathedral in Columbia, SC. Course organist will be Dr. Fred Teardo, Director of Music at the Cathedral of the Advent in Birmingham, AL. Participants will offer music of Gerre Hancock, David Hogan, Philip Wilby, Cecilia McDowall, and Herbert Howells.

The Central NC AGO Chapter has generously sponsored the course's organ scholar, Alden Wright, a rising senior in the organ studio of Nathan Laube at the Eastman School of Music in Rochester, NY. Alden is a native of Salisbury, NC and will greatly benefit from this tremendous experience. He is currently Assistant Organist to Peter DuBois, host of the nationally-syndicated radio program "With Heart and Voice", at Rochester's Third Presbyterian Church.

Chapter members are encouraged to attend the course's closing services on Sunday, July 14 at 11am and 4pm (Choral Evensong), both in Duke Chapel.

Standard of Excellence



Catawba College - Salisbury, North Carolina

Catawba College is a small, faith-based (UCC), liberal arts college located about 45 miles north of Charlotte in the quaint town of Salisbury, NC. The 1000-seat Omwake-Dearborn Chapel, named for two former college presidents, is now 55 years old. At the time of the dedication, an electronic organ was in place but was later replaced by a 42 rank 3 manual Casavant pipe organ. Over the years, the pipe organ fell into disrepair and its baroque tonality fell out of favor. Several attempts were made to either repair the Casavant or replace it. Al Murrell, Vice President of R. A. Daffer Church Organs, Inc., built a strong relationship with Professor Paul Oakley and his successor Dr. Phillip Burgess by providing a Rodgers Organ for several Lessons and Carols services. Because of the relationships Al had built over the years with college personnel, the decision was made to award R. A. Daffer Church Organs, Inc the contract to install a new Rodgers Infinity four manual 84 stop custom organ and interface it with the best 17 ranks of the Casavant. This project, including new chests for the pipes, will be completed in April 2019. We would like to thank Dr. Phillip Burgess, Associate Chair of Music and Mr. Bill Graham, Chair of Trustees for their trust in the selection of a Rodgers Organ to be used for the many weddings and services that are held in this beautiful chapel.



3) Watts Street Organist Tom Bloom will present an organ recital on Saturday, November 23, at 3:00 p.m. The program will include some organ music history and many of the pieces heard Sunday by Sunday, along with new pieces prepared for the occasion.
