MEET OUR NEW MEMBERS

BRETT PARDUE

Brett Pardue proudly serves as Minister of Music and Outreach at Rolesville Baptist Church, where he shepherds a variety of musical ensembles, coordinates the church's community outreach, and assists in pastoral duties.

Brett has held positions in both church music and academia. Prior to joining the staff at RBC, Brett shared his passion for worship as a church musician for congregations in North Carolina, Georgia, and New Jersey. During his time in the Northeast, Brett also held the role of Sametz Artist-in-Residence at Lehigh University, acting as lecturer for introductory voice and voice pedagogy classes, instructor of private voice study, and tenor soloist for the Department of Music. Brett has held additional positions at Rowan University and the University of Georgia as both a keyboardist and vocalist.

Brett has completed graduate studies at the esteemed Westminster Choir College and Princeton Theological Seminary, and he holds degrees from Mars Hill College and the University of Georgia. Brett is currently pursuing his Doctoral degree through the Robert E. Webber Institute for Worship Studies.

As a performer, Brett has been blessed to give solo performances at venues such as Carnegie Hall (New York Lyric Opera, 2017), Lincoln Center (Philharmonia of New York, 2018), and Cincinnati Opera, as well as internationally in Italy, Canada, Austria, and as an ambassador in Japan for Project Hand-in-Hand: an international music exchange designed to support disaster relief efforts.

Thank you, Tamara Lewis, for inviting me to introduce myself to the Central NC chapter members. I retired from Barton College this past May and just moved to Raleigh with my wife, Debbie, to be closer to our son who works for NCSU. We sold our Wilson home in just 3 days after putting it on the market, so our move to Raleigh was more rushed than we had planned.

My organ degrees are from Boston University where I studied organ with George Faxon, Jack Fisher, and Max Miller. Most of my career as a church musician has been in Catholic and Episcopal churches in Massachusetts, Lakeland, Florida and in Wilson.

In the early 90s, I started dabbling in electronic music for fun. By the mid-90s, I was sure that the entertainment industry needed my skills in music technology, so I went back to school to study recording engineering. With a master's in music and my new associate's degree in audio technology, I was a good fit for Barton College, teaching Audio Recording and the occasional Music Appreciation class.

During my first 11 years at Barton, I served as organist/choirmaster for St. Timothy's Episcopal in Wilson. Since 2011, I have subbed at dozens of churches from Bethel to Raleigh, and Rocky Mount to Goldsboro.

I hope to be able to substitute or possibly secure an interim position in this area once the pandemic has subsided. I have some audio work to look forward to as I will be recording the Fayetteville

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Symphony for a video production in October. I am looking forward to recording more concerts and recitals in this area as soon as musical events resume.

Organfest 2020

BEAUTY IN THE MIDST OF CHAOS

OrganFest 2020 was born out of disappointment at the unfortunate need to cancel the AGO National Convention that was to have taken place in Atlanta in early July. The collective sadness at not being able to gather in person, to mingle with friends, attend concerts, hear new music, worship, and learn new skills in workshops, left us feeling deflated and frustrated.

The AGO decided that instead of simply moving the National Convention to a virtual format and charging a fee for members to attend, we wanted to create an online organ festival as a gift to our community; a gift of beauty in an otherwise chaotic time, and one that would be accessible to all free of charge.

The backbone of OrganFest is the performance of five newly-composed organ works, commissioned for the National Convention, preceded by a conversation with the composer. Appearances by two outstanding choirs, as well as by competition winners in interpretation and improvisation in recent American and Canadian organ competitions, supplement the conferral of awards and prizes and brief appearances by National Officers and Councillors.

OrganFest 2020 comprises five evenings of about an hour each of music, traversing a wide range of musical styles and instruments. The Festival premieres each evening at 8pm Eastern, and will be archived so that the contents may be enjoyed again at a later time.

We very much hope that in the chaos of pandemic and unrest these moments of beauty bring you respite and joy.
