Dr. Jason A. Wright is a native of Oxford, North Carolina, and recently returned to NC after living in South Carolina since 2015. While in South Carolina, he was the Dean of the Lowcountry AGO Chapter.

Dr. Wright has earned degrees with distinction in sacred music, organ performance, choral conducting, music education, higher education administration, and liturgical theology. He is an alumnus of East Carolina University, UNC – Greensboro, Indiana University, University of South Carolina, and the University of Notre Dame. His organ teachers include Dr. Robert Parkins and Dr. Jeanette Fishell, with coaching's from Dr. Jack Mitchener and Dr. André Lash.

In addition to his service to the churchfor the last 24 years, Dr. Wright has held academic teaching positions at Canterbury Episcopal School in Greensboro, where he was Chair of the Fine Arts Dept., Guild Tech, and the University of South Carolina. Presently, he is the Director of Music at Historic St. Matthew's Episcopal in Hillsborough, following Dr. David Arcus. Seeing the need to begin a second career during Covid, he is now a senior manager at Elite Management, Inc. in Raleigh.



As scholar, his articles appear in Oxford's Grove Dictionary of Music and Musicians, the Choral Journal, the Journal of the Anglican Association of Musicians, and The Organist's Companion. As a presenter, he has given workshops at Regional AGO and ACDA Conventions. As a recitalist, he has performed for AGO Chapters across the US and at venues such as Chapel of the Cross, Chapel Hill, The Cathedral Church of St. Phillip, Atlanta, Peachtree Road UMC, Atlanta, The Cathedral Church of St. Mark, Salt Lake City, Utah, St. James by the Sea, La Jolla, CA, First Congregational Church, Columbus, Ohio, and The Cathedral Church of St. John the Divine, NYC.

He and his partner of 13 years live in Raleigh with their two Mini-Schnauzers Lady Adeline and Sir Windsor. In his free time, he enjoys sailing, collecting model ships, and seascape acrylic oil paintings, both antique and modern. 

The Chapel Choir, Vespers Ensemble, and Evensong Singers combine with the Mallarmé Chamber Players to remember those we have lost in the past two years, and rejoice in the promise of new life and resurrection. Music by Mendelssohn and Langlais joins the familiar strains of the Fauré Requiem to offer comfort and consolation. It has come to the attention of the Professional Relations Director that we have churches that do not understand that resumes are for the purview of the appropriate search committee. If confidentiality is critical to you, please make it clear in your cover letter that this is a requirement for you, at least in the initial stages of inquiry and dialogue.

If you are seeking a supply organist, the fastest method is to contact the Professional Relations Director with all the pertinent information. When sent to all members by email, many requests are filled within one hour. This method has saved a lot of time otherwise spent in calling an ever-changing list of names.
