A WEEK OF PEDALS AND PIPES — PIPE ORGAN ENCOUNTER+

Thanks to generous scholarships from our Central NC Chapter, Sally Mullis and I attended the Pipe Organ Encounter Plus (for Adults) August 14-19, 2022 in Richmond, VA which was sponsored by the Richmond Chapter.

Lest you think POE+ was a sort of "organ spa week", I submit the following in the context of a six day event:

6 hours of private lessons

6 hours of practice time

10 churches visited

14 organs played and observed

22 faculty

14 participants

10+ pounds of new music and swag to bring home

We started each morning with a lecture/seminar at 7:45 am and we were on our individual organ benches practicing and having a 90 minute private lesson by 9:30 am.

After lunch we:

- 1) played digital organs in two residences
- 2) visited the Grooms and Payne organ builders (and two churches in rural Louisa, VA)
- 3) enjoyed an organ crawl in two downtown churches
- 4) heard presentations on quality music for manuals, practice tips, and how to get your music published

Evenings included two recitals, a masterclass, a presentation about how to run an organ committee, another organ crawl, Celtic Evensong and a chanted compline service.

In summing up my experience to friends and family, I simply said, "It was intense."

One of my personal highlights was that I brought a favorite piece, an arrangement of the hymn "Sing Out" by Marty Haugen, to study with my instructor, the composer, Mary Beth Bennett. I had loved the composition for years, but had never mastered it. When it came time to propose it to her as my focus piece for the week, I was shocked to realize she had written it! (It is in the Augsburg Organ Series *Summer* collection.) What a delight to have her input (and what a responsibility to convey her intentions!) and what a nerve-wracking joy to share it with the other participants at the final recital.

A huge shout-out to the Richmond Chapter for their incredible organization, dedication, and a wealth of shared knowledge. Besides the new (to me) music and the practice tips I brought home, I also have new friends and colleagues, a new appreciation for the investment in instruments and church music that Richmond congregations have made, a new commitment to studying improvisation, and a renewed sense that we are part of the tapestry of faith that weaves through centuries, cultures, personal styles, and common challenges.

Organ Scholar Program Hosting

The AGO Organ Scholar Program will offer a young person the opportunity to experience a one-year interiwithin a significant music ministry program somewhere in the United States. This gap year program will ta place during the 2022–2023 and 2023–2024 program years (one recipient per year for a total of two recipient two different locations).

The program model is designed to include combined investments from AGO National Headquarters, a local chapter, and a host church: \$10,000 each, for a total of \$30,000. In addition, the host church is expected to provide housing and healthcare for the organ scholar.

The deadline to apply to host an organ scholar is September 30.

The Organ Scholar Program offers emerging organists the opportunity to experience an annual ten-month internship within a significant music ministry program in the United States. The first year of the training program coincides with the 2022–2023 academic year and is being hosted at Duke University Chapel. The program model is designed to include combined investments from AGO National Headquarters, a local AGO chapter, and a host church for a total of \$30,000. In addition, the host church provides housing and healthcare options for the organ scholar.

This includes both permanent "open benches" and also one-time "substitute dates." The Guild cannot endorse or recommend any person for a job or substitute date. Membership in the AGO is open to all who pay dues, regardless of education, experience, ability and/or skills. The AGO Professional Relations Director passes along information, which may include salaries offered by institutions and specifics about jobs/dates, as information is received from an institution. AGO members are encouraged to negotiate salaries and explore options with each offered position. The Central North Carolina Chapter, AGO does not accept responsibility for the accuracy of material provided for these listings, nor does inclusion of information in the listings imply endorsement by the chapter.

It has come to the attention of the Professional Relations Director that we have churches that do not understand that resumes are for the purview of the appropriate search committee. If confidentiality is critical to you, please make it clear in your cover letter that this is a requirement for you, at least in the initial stages of inquiry and dialogue.

If you are seeking a supply organist, the fastest method is to contact the Professional Relations Director with all the pertinent information. When sent to all members by email, many requests are filled within one hour. This method has saved a lot of time otherwise spent in calling an ever-changing list of names.
