Lord, Hear My Cry: An Evening of Spiritual Songs

Thursday, March 2 at 7:00 p.m.

Black spirituals and German chorales are disparate genres of sacred music, separated by centuries and continents. Yet both genres share a communal orientation and a theological concern with justice and hope. This concert will feature settings of spirituals and chorales—historical and contemporary, choral and congregational—interspersed with thematic commentary. Admission is tree.

Instrumental Concertos by Johann Sebastian Bach

Sunday, March 5 at 5:00 p.m.

This program features three of J.S. Bach's violin concertos, including the "Double Concerto" for two violins and orchestra. The Chapel's conductor-in-residence, Dr. Philip Cave, directs the performance by the musicians of Mallarmé Music. The pieces to be performed are:

- Violin Concerto in A minor, BWV 104
- Violin Concerto in E major, BWV 1042
- Concerto for Two Violins in D minor, BWV 1043

Before the concert at 4:00 p.m. in the Divinity School's Goodson Chapel, Chad Fothergill, the Chapel's interim organist, will give a talk on "Bach's Concertos: It's a Southern Thing." Families with young children are invited to come to an open rehearsal the day before the concert (Saturday, March 4) between 2:00 and 4:00 p.m. in Duke Chapel.

ROBERT PARKINS IN RECITAL SUNDAY, MARCH 26, 2023 AT 5:00 PM

Dr. Robert Parkins, university organist and a professor of the practice of music at Duke, performs this recital on the Flentrop organ with music by Johann Sebastian Bach, George Frederic Handel, Johann Ernst Eberlin, Domenico Scarlatti, and Jean-François Dandrieu. Admission is free. Dr. Parkins's solo recordings have appeared on the Calcante, Gothic, Loft, Musical Heritage Society, and Naxos labels. This year's recital is the third segment of a trilogy related to organ music by Johann Sebastian Bach. "J. S. Bach and His Contemporaries" will feature works of Bach and contemporaneous composers from Germany, Austria, Italy, Spain, and France. THE 13TH ANNUAL YOUNG ARTISTS COMPETITION IN ORGAN PERFORMANCE

March 9-10, 2023 Greenville, NC

The East Carolina University Young Artists Competition for Pre-College Organists is an innovative outreach program designed to inspire young musicians to strive for the highest level of musicianship and technical accomplishment in organ performance. The competition is open to any pre-college organ student in the United States.

The competition is staged in two rounds. Three finalists will be chosen from the recorded application round to compete live on March 10, 2023, on the Perkins and Wells Memorial Organ, C.B. Fisk, Opus 126, at St. Paul's Episcopal Church, which borders the ECU campus.

The organ faculty will also be available to offer private lessons to competitors following the competition.

Eligibility and application procedure:

Pre-college students between the ages of 13-18 who are residents of the US. Current students of the judges and previous first place winners are ineligible.

Application form, \$45 fee and recordings postmark deadline: January 15, 2023.

Awards:

First prize: The Cathee Jean Huber Memorial Prize, \$1,500 Second Prize: The Fisk Prize, \$750 Third prize: The American Guild of Organists Prize, \$300 The Bach Prize: recognizing the outstanding performance of a work by J.S. Bach \$100 The Hymn Playing Prize: recognizing the day's most outstanding hymn playing \$100

It has come to the attention of the Professional Relations Director that we have churches that do not understand that resumes are for the purview of the appropriate search committee. If confidentiality is critical to you, please make it clear in your cover letter that this is a requirement for you, at least in the initial stages of inquiry and dialogue.

If you are seeking a supply organist, the fastest method is to contact the Professional Relations Director with all the pertinent information. When sent to all members by email, many requests are filled within one hour. This method has saved a lot of time otherwise spent in calling an ever-changing list of names.
