CHAPTER LEVEL AGO/QUIMBY REGIONAL COMPETITIONS FOR YOUNG ORGANISTS

Once again, our chapter agreed to be a Quimby Competition site for 2023. There was one applicant, Abigail Crafton from Savannah, GA. She asked to compete at our location because she had musical conflicts with the date for the Atlanta competition.

Abigail Crafton is a high school sophomore. She has studied piano since the age of three, singing since the age of four, and began studying the trumpet in elementary school. At the age of ten she began studying the organ, which she requested when she was three. Abigail currently plays principal trumpet in the Armstrong Youth Orchestra, and has been first chair Georgia All-State in 2021, 2022.

The audition was at noon. Our judges were Mark Andersen, Stephen Aber, and Tanner Winchester. After Abby's performance, they agreed that she should move forward to the next level, the Quimby Regional Competition at our Southeast AGO Convention in Augusta, GA, in June. EARLY COOPER-MILLER SCHOLARSHIP WINNER IS STILL WINNING!

Katherine Johnson, Cooper-Miller 2014, has won a prestigious statewide competition in Ohio, sponsored by the Tuesday Musical Association. She is currently a 5th year student at Oberlin College-Conservatory, studying English and Organ Performance.

Now in its 67th year, Tuesday Musical is a charitable arts organization in NE Ohio. Their 2023 Scholarship Competition was Saturday, March 18, at The University of Akron's Guzzetta Hall and Westminster Presbyterian Church (the latter for the organ category). This year's adjudicated competition drew more than 120 students majoring in music performance and music education at colleges and universities throughout Ohio. Categories included music education, brass, marimba/classical steel pan, organ, piano, strings, voice, woodwinds, and classical guitar.

INQUIRING MINDS WANT TO KNOW:

Where IS returning member, Jackie Nappi these days? She's at Yale, graduating this May, and currently in the thick of recital prep and graduation/job plans. In all the hustle and bustle, Jackie took time to answer a few questions for her fans back home.

What has your focus/specialty been during your time at Yale? My focus has been on getting to know two instruments in particular at Yale: the Taylor & Boody instrument in Marquand Chapel (perfect for early music) and the famous Woolsey Hall organ (great for Dupré, Reubke, Howells, etc). I've also taken advantage of the university in general and have taken classes in Spanish and German in addition to being a member of the Yale Triathlon Team!

What has been a standout experience/revelation in your time there? I would have to say playing in Woolsey Hall and building relationships with my classmates and other Yale students. It's been such a privilege to play the instrument in Woolsey and I've absolutely fallen in love with organ rep such as Reubke's 94th Psalm, which I'm playing in my final recital there at the end of April. Also, my classmates have made all the difference in my experience here; they're not only some of the most talented organists I've yet to meet, but they're the nicest folks who I have the honor of calling colleagues and grad school buddies. I'm excited to continue our journey as organists outside of Yale once we're all out in the real world together!

What do you miss from NC? The pine trees! Haha, they are simply too beautiful. But also, seriously, I miss the people of course. I grew up in Cary and spent about seven years in Raleigh-Durham as a working adult after college so I miss the community I had built there.

What are you looking forward to after graduation? Going to Mexico! The Yale Institute of Sacred Music is taking its students (which includes the organists) on a trip to Mexico to learn about and play historical instruments in Oaxaca and Mexico City. I'm so excited about this trip and the



opportunity not only to play some of these Spanish-style baroque instruments, but to also use my Spanish! I'm sure I'll also build many fun memories with my classmates, who I couldn't have done this degree successfully without!
