WHERE ARE THEY NOW?

Cy Sagan:

Andersen Scholarship Winner 2023
FOX VALLEY AGO CHAPTER PIPE ORGAN ENCOUNTER
JUNE 18 – 23, 2023, WHEATON, IL

My name is Cy Sagan, a 14 year old organist in training from Raleigh. In June 2023, I attended the Pipe Organ Encounter (POE) in Wheaton, IL. I had a great time being immersed in the art of the pipe organ and loved the long days of workshops, recitals, lessons, tours, and much more. I'd like to share a little about some of my most memorable experiences.

Sanfilippo Foundation tour and theater organ experience: We say a huge collection of mechanical, self-playing instruments and saw the world's largest restored indoor theater organ.


Berghaus organ factory tour: I witnessed how organs are designed, built, tuned, and voiced.

Rockefeller Memorial Chapel: We enjoyed a tour of the bell tower and carillon where we watched a carillon demonstration and got to walk around the top of the bell tower. I even got to ring one of the large bells. It was so large that multiple people could fit inside!

Free Music: One of the best parts of POE was visiting the room that contained 30 or so boxes of free organ music! I had the opportunity to visit every night to collect scores, method books, improvisation workbooks, organ music books, and CDs.

My teacher was Dr. Margaret Harper. Interestingly, when Dr. Harper was approximately my age, she was a student of my parish's current music director, and my organ teacher, Dr. David Eaton. Unfortunately, she tested positive for COVID-19 after the second day of camp. However, I am thankful for Mr. David Lincoln making the right decisions and making sure that camp could continue despite Dr. Harper testing positive. I am also thankful for Dr. Naomi Rawley who filled in as my teacher for the week. I played Bach's Prelude in F for the recital. Dr. Harper introduced me to the French composer Louis Vierne and gave me one of his books, 24 *Pieces en Style Libre*.

My two favorite workshops were Service Playing by Dr. Sunghee Kim and Improvisation by Dr. Douglas Cleveland. In the Service Playing workshop I learned about the organ's importance in worship, how to accompany a congregation, how to learn a new hymn, and about tempo, pulse, phrasing, articulation, touch, registration, hymn introductions, and choral organ accompaniment. In the Improvisation workshop I learned how to improvise in bicinium (two part), ostinato (repeated figuration), and





toccata formats. I also learned how to harmonize with fourths and fifths and how to accompany a melody with parallel thirds and sixths.

Overall, I had a phenomenal experience in Wheaton and would love to attend another POE next year. Thank you to all the teachers, organists, organizers, and coordinators who made the event possible, especially Mr. David Lincoln, Mr. Steven Wente, Mr. Doug Zimmer, and Dr. Naomi Rowley.



I am a 13 year old organist who also plays 4 other instruments and sings. I have been fortunate to have traveled the US on two Broadway National Tours which has allowed me the opportunity to play some of the most amazing pipe organs including the Wanamaker, Midmer-Losh, Salt Lake City Tabernacle and The Hazel Wright Organ as well as so many others. When I travel it's always my number one priority to find pipe organs in that area to visit and play. I am currently playing pipe organ for services at Irving Park UMC.

I am excited to be a new member of the Central North Carolina Chapter and look forward to meeting other members and being involved with events and competitions as a young organist. I am very passionate about getting other young people excited about the organ, so if there is ever anything I can do to help please let me know.

ABOUT MARK ANDERSEN

Mark Andersen is an internationally known theatre and classical organist. He has been the organist for the Boston Symphony and Boston Pops under Arthur Fiedler, head staff music arranger for NBC in New York, Artist in Residence for both Hammond Castle in Massachusetts and Daniels Recital Hall in Seattle, Washington. He designs pipe organ control systems for Artisan Instruments in Seattle and records for International Artists Foundation both on CD, DVD, and live Television via the weekly TV program "Crescendo!" heard nationally on Time Warner and Comcast Cable. Mark has over 35 recordings on CD published to date and has twice won the International Composer's Competition in Amsterdam, Holland. He has been a featured artist at three American Theatre Organ Society Conventions and enjoys the Big Band style of music from the 20s, 30s,and 40s. In the past Mark has taken lessons from both Jesse Crawford and George Wright. He now teaches both classical organ and theatre organ from his studio where he has two four-manual organs, one theatre and one classical. Mark's favorite musical theater composers are George Gershwin and Irving Berlin and he loves to take his audiences down memory lane.



GEOFFREY SIMON, Organ

Geoffrey Simon recently served as Organist and Choral Director at Holy Trinity Lutheran Church and at Raleigh Moravian Church, where he is also Organ Curator of the historic Adam Stein organ, and as a Contributing Critic for CVNC. A Fellow of the College of Church Musicians at Washington National Cathedral, where he studied with Leo Sowerby and Paul Callaway, he holds the Doctor of Musical Arts degree from Peabody Conservatory/Johns Hopkins University. He was Director of University Choirs at The American University in Washington, DC before becoming Professor of Church Music at Wesley Seminary. Dr. Simon has played and/or conducted in twenty U.S. states and in many European capitals. He is one of the few Americans invited to play at the Thomaskirche

in Leipzig, Germany, where J.S. Bach served as Cantor. Also a harpsichordist, he has performed at the Smithsonian Institution, the Library of Congress, the National Cathedral and the NC Museum of Art. He has conducted orchestral and choral programs at the Kennedy Center and at Wolf Trap Farm for the Performing Arts, and recently served with David Eaton at Cathedral through the holiday seasons.

The program will feature three great passacaglias of organ literature, by the German Romantic era composer Max Reger, the Baroque era master J.S. Bach, and 20th-century American romantic (and Pulitzer Prize winner) Leo Sowerby, one of Dr. Simon's teachers.

If you are seeking a supply organist, the fastest method is to contact the Professional Relations Director with all the pertinent information. When sent to all members by email, many requests are filled within one hour. This method has saved a lot of time otherwise spent in calling an ever-changing list of names.
